

THAT WAS THEN, THIS IS NOW Session 1: The Tabernacle

Key Scripture:

Roman 12:1

Opening Remarks:

For 430 years the children of Israel had been held captive by the Egyptians. Moses was chosen by God to be the leader of this mass exodus into the promised land. Pharoah was reluctant to release them, but after a series of ten plagues, he finally agreed. The journey was anything but easy; however, God always makes a way to connect with His people!

Questions:

- 1. The word *Tabernacle* indicates a meeting place with God, and God gave a detailed plan for it. Why do you think God gave such exact instructions for the Tabernacle?
- Do you have a meeting place with God in your daily personal life? Describe the things you do to meet with God.
- 3. Where can you see parallels between our new covenant of salvation and the Tabernacle plan? How does it feel to know we can directly find forgiveness through Jesus Christ now?

Closing Remarks:

Jesus Christ really is the same yesterday, today, and forever. He has been looking out for us from the beginning of time until now. He has always made a way for His people, and He always will!

THAT WAS THEN, THIS IS NOW Session 2: The Blood

Key Scriptures:

Hebrews 9:21

Opening Remarks:

From the Tabernacle all the way to Jesus, sins were only atoned (pushed ahead temporarily). After Jesus shed His blood at Calvary, our sins can be forgiven! Like the song says, the blood of Jesus still "reaches to the highest mountain and flows to the lowest valley!

Discussion Questions:

- How does it feel to know Jesus' blood is so powerful that it can make any sin you've ever committed disappear as though it never happened?
- Jesus bled from specific places on his physical body. If those places could represent the areas of needs in our lives, how could you pray to receive God's touch in all parts of your life?
- 3. What area of your life could you make a point of focused prayer this week?

Closing Remarks:

What a privilege it is to know that we can be washed in the blood so our sins are forgiven. Take some time to thank God for freedom and new life through His sacrifice!

THAT WAS THEN, THIS IS NOW Session 3: The Armor of God

Key Scriptures:

Romans 13:14; Ephesians 6:14-18

Opening Remarks:

We live in a constant state of battle and war, fighting for our spiritual survival. We believe the promise of God through Isaiah is true: no weapon formed against us shall prosper. Though the enemy has weapons to use against us, we can rest assured God has made provision to make sure we are protected.

Discussion Questions:

- 1. By what ways have you overcome spiritual attacks from the enemy in the past?
- 2. Why do you think Paul used the metaphor of a soldier with armor to describe the ways in which God's Spirit works in our lives to protect us?
- 3. How can you apply the whole armor of God to your life?

Closing Remarks:

We must not neglect prayer; it is how we draw strength from God. Without prayer and a complete dependency on God, our attempt at spiritual warfare is futile and pointless. God has given us the whole armor of God—truth, righteousness, the gospel, faith, salvation, the Word of God, and prayer. Pursuing God and applying these weapons enable us to become more than conquerors, overcoming all of Satan's attacks and temptations.

Key Scripture:

Hebrews 9:11-12

Opening Remarks:

- 3. What has been the most important takeaway from this series for your life?
